EUROPEAN CUP

Dear Lesley,

After competing in this event for the first time this year I felt compelled to write a letter to the Mag.

If you're not a hard core competition jumper and don't get enthusiastic about boogie jumping, this could be what you're looking for.

I recently entered this event as part of *Mixteen 16* and think it is one of the best skydiving meets I've been to in my ten years in the sport. I found the boogie atmosphere mixed with an underlying spirit of competition to be something I had not encountered before.

The competition format has several advantages over doing boogie jumps. These are, you're jumping with friends, being in competition adds an extra edge, there is an increased sense of reward from doing a good jump, a real camaraderie and vibe builds amongst the team. It also gives a natural conclusion to the event and because people take it easy until the competition is over you can quarantee everybody is 'up for it' on the last night!

The competition was held over three days, commencing on the Thursday and reaching a high on the Saturday night with the prize-giving and a party that went on till dawn. There were 13 teams ranging in ability and beauty. The Space Girls were close to the bottom of the pile in ability but they more than made up for this in their contribution to atmosphere and beauty. At the other end of the scale were Another Planet, who have skydiving ability and character in abundance - but beauty? - as they say, it's in the eye of the beholder.

There were 10 rounds drawn from the official dive pool. Four rounds were completed on the first day, the same on the next day and two Saturday morning. Four aircraft were used, these were: Skyvan, Twin Otter, Casa 212 and 235. Each round was allocated to a particular aircraft This meant you had teams doing different rounds simultaneously. For instance team A could be doing round 1 out of the Skyvan while team B would be doing round 4 out of a Casa. However, at the end of each day things had evened themselves out so you could take stock of the overall position.

Although *Mixteen* was never going to be in contention for a medal you do find yourself wanting to beat the teams at your level. I am proud to say *Mixteen* managed to tie with *Armee De L'Air* who have hundreds of training jumps and overall we came 8th. We also managed to put a three on the board, not bad for a group of individuals who had never jumped together before the start of this year.

The highlight of the event was the prize-giving with *Another Planet* taking gold and setting a new World Record to boot. It was great to see a UK team come out on top in international competition.

After the prize-giving was a meal and a truly memorable party that went on through the night. The competition was done in exactly the right spirit and the French were the most welcoming of hosts. See you there next year!

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

went off again in early August in Quincy, Illinois, USA. This year attendance was down a little with ONLY 4,000 skydivers registered. There are more aircraft here than you can shake a stick at. 727 Jet, Ford Tri Motor, 4 Super Otters, a Casa, Skyvan, King Air, Bell Huey helicopter, flown by an ex 'Nam and Hollywood Pilot. This is the 'E Ticket' ride, it only goes to 5,000ft but is exciting to the extreme. The pilot puts the skids into the crops, does massive stall turns and generally goes off, especially if you cross his palm with folding wonga. There was a Pitts Special from which the skydiver dangles when the plane is inverted before letting go and falling away to open over the boogie (see pic on page 40). (Managed to get a Cool & Groovy sticker on the bar you hang from, but it took 5 minutes of idle banter with the pilot, before he turned his back on me...) The pilot shoots a load of stills before you let go. Nice. Balloons are available for jumping at dawn or sunset. Quincy is a unique boogle. There are 'No Rules' apart from your own! More skydivers are on the DZ than at any other boogie, anywhere. The average no of jumps is in the 150 - 200 jump mark. Most of them come from 'Cessna' DZ's around the USA. These skydivers are presented with situations that are not normal for them such as

50 canopies in the sky and relatively small landing areas. They hook themselves into the ground, each other, RV's, cars and sundry - be careful dudes! Every night bands play and the skydivers party harder than anywhere elsé. Golf carts zoom around the DZ at all hours festooned with skydivers. Quincy is somewhere all skydivers should go, just for the experience. Provided you keep your wits about you, there is little problem. The strange aircraft are fun to jump and the vibe on the DZ is excellent. Next year there will be an English House DJ for one night, care of Cool & Groovy, so put the dates in your diary and I'll see you there!

Cunningly they combined freefly with a surfer (Giles) and the judges obviously liked it as they were awarded first place. A strange result that shows Freefly is just that - Free! From 1 January 1999 at Strathallan DZ, all experienced parachutists will be expected to wear an audible altimeter in addition to their visual altimeter. Support for this has been given by Cool & Groovy with demo Time-Out! available on the DZ. Keiran Brady, told WoTS "I feel there is no valid reason for jumping without Time-Out! today." Strathallan are following the New Zealand Parachute Association who have also made audible altimeters mandatory. (The rest of this item has been deleted as advertising drivel – Ed)



We all agreed there's 'Unfinished Business'. In 1999 we will produce the UK's first 3 digit formation and we don't intend to stop at 100, that's just the first step.

Instead of just 2 months pre-planning, we now have 11 to get this record and we intend to start right now. Brit 100 is open to everyone, it is not an elitist thing. The team organisation has committed to helping anyone through the selection process and onto the record. Furthermore, it doesn't have to stop in 1999, there are always more records to break...

- · We will promote the sport to the best of our ability

Come the Evolution

Cool & Groovy, manufacturers of the Time-Out audible altimeter, have developed a more advanced product, the Evolution 2000 which features three operating modes. In Solo mode the unit performs as a standard Time-Out; the break-off height bleep is user set, the deployment warning is at 2,500ft and the flat line at 1,500ft. In Custom mode, all three altitude warnings can be user-set. The Timer mode is designed for competitors and will indicate the end of working time, the number of seconds after exit specified by the user. Cool and Groovy claim this is accurate to +/- 0.25

seconds.

Electronic Log Book
The Evolution 2000
automatically stores
data about the jumps
which can be downloaded
to a Mac or PC. Then this
information can be viewed,
manipulated and analysed.
The data can be inputted
directly into Log Book

Software supplied with the unit on CD ROM to give an electronic log book. The software offers a range of options, such as including reminders

for reserve repack dates, Cypres battery change dates, etc. Digital videos and photos can be stored linked to jumps for a permanent, easily accessible video logbook using a Zip, Jazz drive or similar. Personal details such as jump number and freefall time to date can be inputted.

Data Capture

Through the interface and your PC / Mac, you can choose the level of information you would like, for example date, cumulative jump number, exit height, opening height, speed and fall rate at any point, averages, G force on opening, and cumulative freefall time. This will provide an accurate record of the jumper's time in freefall (which has traditionally been a bit of a guesstimate!).

Volume and pitch controls are included in the Evolution 2000, a good feature for head-down flyers who need the units to be loud. Battery life has been increased to between 3 to 5 years and the unit is 16 times more accurate than before. The Evolution 2000 Time-Out is

smaller than the original with dimensions of 11.2 x 36.5 x 64mm which, the manufacturers claim is the smallest audible altimeter in the world. The operating switches are three tactile 'bumps'. The Evolution 2000 is available from Cool & Groovy or dealers from 1 November.

Sales Director George Pilkington pointed out that the Time-Out Evolution 2000 and (not-so) Final Frontier Flashing Edition are the only audible altimeters that couple altitude information with descent rate information. He stated that "This unique feature enables the skydiver, during a malfunction scenario, to audibly monitor both altitude and speed while focusing their attention on rectifying the problem. If the malfunction has not been cleared when the 1500ft Flat Line warning sounds, the jumper should action reserve procedures immediately. During any malfunction with an unsafe descent rate, the skydiver absolutely must know where 1500ft is. Only Time-Out! will definitely give you this essential information.'

If the Glove Fits..

A Floridian based company, Complete Sports is marketing their sports gloves to skydivers at a lower cost than the similar *Newman* gloves which many skydivers use. Three different glove ranges are suitable for skydiving. The *Hitter* is a light, close-fitting glove in Spandex and very soft leather with a wrist band closure, it costs £12.95. The *Sure-Tack* is the same glove made from tackier leather and costs \$19.95, this new model will be available from November. The *SPL Tech* is made from a heavier weight of leather and would be suitable for colder weather. It features a wraparound wrist band and seamless palm and costs \$34.95. The SPL Tech is designed for skydiving but our

testers felt they preferred the Hitter or Sure-Tack for summer jumping and for competition.

Gloves are available from mid – end October in a range of sizes in black, some with coloured trim. In November the Hitter will be available in white. The Complete Sports catalogue offers other gloves which look suitable for skydiving such as their fingerless cycling-style gloves, the Mesh-Back, 1/2 finger and 3/4 finger and the Premium Cabretta. As a bonus the company also offers glove sizes and styles specifically designed for women.

Definitely Not A Javelin – No Siree!

A French company has released onto the market a new harnesss/container called the *Advance*. In appearance it looks very similar to a *Javelin* and it is manufactured by Sunpath's exdistributor in France, Parafun. Several features are included as standard such as hip rings, velcroless toggles and cloth loop

cutaway/reserve handles which the company claim offers security in all freefall body positions. The container is Cypres ready and can

accommodate a Steven's Lanyard or LES system.

LES is a new system designed by Eric Fradet which works like an RSL but is

attached to the reserve free bag.

The LES system is used by BASE jumpers as it gives a quick reserve deployment. But informed opinion recommends against LES for



advantage.

Just the Prescription

It was with interest I read of Dr Neville Cohen's prescription goggles in last issue's Kit News. Cohen make goggles for many different sports, all illustrated at

http://www.bobster.com. Approach the site with caution as just two

models are recommended for skydivers; EZ Riderz (model BA001) and the T2Z (model BC006). The company admit that

admit that ordering by phone will be quicker than using the online web site order forms.

The EZ Riderz are available in clear, grey or amber tints. Grey is apparently the most popular with skydivers, available in four shades and recommended 'for glare protection and accurate colour transmission'. Amber is recommended for 'sharp definition in low light conditions'. The goggles themselves are extremely comfy, thanks to the squidgy foam

backing, they did not leave irritating red marks the way previous goggles did. There are small vents in the foam backing to prevent fogging which certainly seem to work. All-round vision on the clear lenses is fine and (touch wood!) the polycarbonate lenses seem to do a good job of protecting the lenses from scratches. I'm never aware they're there — I could

never have said the same about my previous 'glasses and goggles' combination. The EZ Riderz

prescription goggles cost

\$79.95 plus shipping costs plus \$20 for (essential) scratch-resistant polycarbonate lens. A discount is offered for additional pairs. In my case it worked out at £125 for two pairs – not much more than the cost of the glasses I trashed on my first few jumps. The goggles arrived 3-4 weeks after ordering.



New Line Stowage

Jump Shack, manufacturers of the *Racer* harness/container have developed a bag with line stows nearer to the middle of the bag.



The company claims that the new location prompts jumpers to make properly-sized stows that align with the edge of the bag but do not wrap around the corners. This seems logical now that most jumpers are making bigger stows (2-3" is normal) than when deployment bags were originally designed. The company claims the new positioning balances the weight of the loops with the weight of line between loops. The added benefit Jump Shack states is that the deployment bag will fit more easily and neatly into the container. Jump Shack have developed the

rigs two years ago. During the last year Jump Shack has been putting both old and new stow band retainer loops on all of their bags. The results from the field have shown the new stowage position is so popular that they now only

offer this new location.





DEVELOPMENT

Remember it is always easy to spend money; only by the good planning applied to the BPA's funds have we moved from being in debt a decade ago, to now having a margin of available reserves. The original intention was to build up a substantial amount and then use the interest payable each year to fund the Association. At present we are halfway to that amount; members' subscriptions only represent half our required income. If you feel you can positively advise please do get in touch with Charles Ross.

Sponsorship

The BPA is still looking for someone to raise corporate funds for the Association. Newcomers to the sport are people with available income who want to take part in perceived dangerous pursuits; this is a carefully targeted audience of interest to sponsors. What the BPA needs is someone who understands the complexities of modern sponsorship co-ordination to present these facts. If you know someone who can do it - then get in touch.

Merit Payments

The Development Committee has been awarding money to various different parties who have been benefiting the Association. The *Brit 100* project did a brilliant job of getting the sport into the public's eye; *Team Playstation* have been getting more exposure for the sport and are putting a package together

that might be suitable for interactive educational projects. Riggers Committee have been awarded some funds to bring their manuals and course structures up to date. Another Planet were made an extraordinary payment of £5,000 to assist them in attending the first 16-way FS World Cup as the British Team.

The donated units from RAPA have been modified, given a current service and distributed to various DZ's around the country. There were still a couple of units available for hire when this magazine went to print: contact lan Midgley if your DZ needs some.

COUNCIL





A World Record formation skydive of 246 people was built over Skydive Chicago, Illinois on 26 July from an altitude of 20,000ft. The formation was held for 7.3 seconds and is a World Record, beating the previous record of 200 built in Florida during July 1992. The record-breaking jump was the twenty-fourth out of a planned twenty-five that were to be made over the period of 19 - 26 July. Jump number 20 completed as a 259-way but was held for only 2.2 seconds, 0.8 seconds longer would have made that a record. The first day of the record attempt was marred by tragedy – the death of Sandy Wambach on jump number three due to a mid-air collision. Sandy was not wearing a Cypres.

Roger Nelson, owner and operator of Skydive Chicago had been planning the World Record attempt ever since the previous largest formation attempt that he organised in Lake Wales, Florida in 1995. The attempt was planned for 300 skydivers and was part of the opening attractions for the new Skydive Chicago drop zone. The participants list had been full and oversubscribed, since about October 1997. It was thus not a lurker-friendly situation! Roger's plan was to start jumper number one with 300 people and reduce the numbers jump by jump until left with a team that could deliver a World Record.



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Did you know?

...that only two Council members have no business interests in sport parachuting?

Well this ad caused a stir!!

What was the point behind the ad?

The vast majority of Council members are more than just fun jumpers. Many make their living from the sport. The current Council includes two CCI's, two Riggers, three self employed AFF or Tandem instructors and most others have some commercial interests in parachuting. These people see and understand the need to direct our sport and protect its future.

The rest of the jumpers in the UK tend to feel the running of the sport is outside of both their control and their interest. Neither of these feelings is correct. Let me explain:

No control?

There are 4,500 only experienced jumpers in the UK, together we form an Association known as the BPA, which is controlled by a group (Council) of just 15 people. Anyone can stand for Council. If more than 15 people stand then Council members will be voted for by the membership. It is so rare to have more than 15 people interested that generally, those who stand for Council will be on it. Once on Council you have a big say in what goes on. Council members become the directors of BPA Ltd, a company which has a turnover of £1/2 million and reserves in the bank of £2/3 million.

No interest?

What if I said that skysurfing will be banned, that AAD's will

become mandatory all over the UK, that all over-30's will have to have a medical, that funding will no longer be given to National teams and that noone will be allowed to jump after 6pm? Still not interested? I think you get my drift. Deep down we all do care - or we wouldn't moan so much at decisions we don't like. You will probably find, when you look inside you, that you do have strong ideas about what should and shouldn't happen in our sport. Why not put these ideas into action?

Is it time for a change?

We need more than 15 people to stand or there is no point in having a democratically elected Council. We need more 'Joe Public', more of the fun jumper's point of view, a varied more Council composed of people with a range of backgrounds and interests. For many years Council has been mostly made up of people who work in the sport. There is no suggestion that any of these people have

abused their position or lack integrity - it is just that the Council this creates is more business oriented purely by the nature of its members.

What does Council do?

Council is the governing body of the Association, and hence is responsible for all things to do with the sport. There are three standard levels of operation:

Iong term - Council directs strategic policy medium term - Council is broken down into subcommittees which create tactical plans current - Operations are down to the BPA Office and individuals appointed by subcommittees

The Council does not involve itself with day to day operations but subcommittees do. The skill of Council is to be able to pull resources together, to be aware and to be proactive with the needs of the membership.

Council members need to work hard to be effective, there is an abundance of paperwork to read as well as specific tasks. It is important that individuals also sit on subcommittees appropriate to their talents.

The subcommittees with areas of responsibility are as follows:

Development & Finance

- · directing the future of the sport and financial planning
- · writing and implementing the Development Plan
- · applying to the Sports Council for grants

Competitions Committee

- regulating individual disciplines
- arranging Regional and National Championships
- · choosing and financing National Teams for World Championship events

Communications Committee

- · communicating to members and to potential first time jumpers
- · overseeing the magazine, first timer brochure and the web page

Espace (Small Aircraft !?!) Boogie

The Espace Boogie in Vichy, France ran from 25 July-2 August. Because of the success of last year with the Antonov, which climbed to altitude in just eight minutes, many skydivers planned to be here this year. However, the plane was blocked in Yemen (Middle East) one week before the boogie started. The organisers were obviously very disappointed about the aircraft problem. They spread the bad news to as many people as possible and compensated by bringing in two Casas, a Skyvan and a Super Otter and dropping jump prices.

629 skydivers still registered, completing 413 lifts and 8,840 jumps. Amongst them was a big group of freeflyers who were impressed with the big name freefly organisers. Next to the Freefly Festival in Eloy, this boogie must be the biggest Freefly party. The organisers included; Olav Zipser, Omar Alhegelan, Charles Bryan, Stephan Fardel, Sylvain Turina, Seb Merian, Knut Krecker, and the FlyBoyz. A group of chute assis led by Oliver JB performed a new world best performance with a 14-way chute assis.

The FS organised groups were well attended with 10 load organisers leading groups from 12way to 40-way sequential. The Boogie organisers wanted to fly only two aircraft in formation to prevent the manifest being slowed down. Most participants understood that the problems of aircraft and bad weather were out of the control of the organisers and it was still a very good boogie with high quality skydives and a great atmosphere.

The organisers are already working on next year when the Antonov 72 should be back. Place and time are still unsure but Vichy in the begining of August is the first option, if the organisers get clear guarantees from the city of Vichy and its air traffic controllers.



NUTZ - that's how she was always known and that's how she will always be remembered. It is impossible to cram into a few short words all that she achieved and all that she meant to the hundreds of skydivers who were fortunate enough to know her. Nutz left us on 5 August after a four year battle with cancer.

For 17 years Nutz worked alongside her partner lan Louttit at the Dunkeswell International Skydiving Centre (DISC) in Devon – a club still sorely missed by all who jumped there. She later instructed at both Eaglescott and Cornwall Parachute Centres. It has been seven years since DISC closed, so for those whose memories are a little rusty, a few reminders of Nutz...

She will always be remembered for the candyfloss explosion of black hair, never quite under control, scraped back behind mirrored shades. This shot is taken from an inverted Pitts Special biplane, at 4,000 ft over Quincy, Illinois at this year's freefall convention. You get into the position when the plane is flying normally, by standing in the seat and holding onto the handle on the top wing. Once standing, the pilot flips the plane and you allow your legs to fall out of the cockpit. You hang on long enough for a roll of film to be taken and then drop off! but confidently taking up the wrong grips. Bronze went to Fairweather Friends (pictured), a local Weston team. As usual prizes were presented by Lena Dixon.





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PEOPLE IN THE SPORT



Spotty Bowles drian Nicholas spent six

months of last year on the road as cameraflyer with Patrick DeGayardon. He did three commercials, a couple of movies and plenty of TV.

Adrian competed at the World Games and the World Air Games with Olav Zipser where he won bronze for the UK. He won a Gold and a Silver on the two rounds of the Pro tour that he could make. Now he has a Guinness World Record for the furthest human flight.

He spent the winter in Sebastian running a freefly school with Olav.

How many jumps did you make last year Adrian?

I was lucky, it was a good year. More than two and a half thousand, in 14 countries.

How many in England? Two.

You like to fly on your head with formation skydivers, don't

Very much. It's fun to follow people and film them in their speciality. I flew camera on the Swedish 107 record. It was a real treat. Two Hercules. The military look after you better than an airline. A hundred people diving to take their place in the jigsaw. Its fun to fly amongst the swarm and see it become this huge piece. I want to film more FS.

You've held three seminars in Sweden now.

Yes. I love to jump in Sweden. The seminars were a great success. People with different goals and different strengths. They listen and they learn very fast. The clubs have some great ideas. They have a good way of keeping people under their wing when they are low time, or supporting people low time in a particular discipline.

Why does freeflying please vou so much?

It means that I can do whatever I want, while you do whatever you like. I like the control, it's a powerful way to





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fly. Its much easier to move and change the speed. You have so many choices. It's a blend of discipline and imagination. There's always another way that you can be where you want to be. Now people are learning to track more strongly the game can become more three dimensional. You can end up with more time than FS.

Should freeflyers exit first or last?

Be flexible. Common sense will always work better than something set in stone. First, middle, last, it can all work. Be flexible so everyone lands on the drop zone and we don't have unnecessary go-arounds. Some people on a load may need to be looked after more than others. Its simple enough, there has to be an appropriate gap between groups. Some people can safely be put out more quickly than others. Efficiency and safety will both come from some flexibility.

What would you ban?

It's easier to make recommendations than ban everything. I hate leg-strap throwaway pilot chutes. If you have a leg pocket and fly other than belly to earth, it puts you and anyone near you at great risk. When I make this point it has been suggested that it's more dangerous to retrain people to deploy a different system. This gives me little confidence that they would be suitably aware to distinguish between malfunctions.

You are known for having a different approach to safety?

Our students all check their own gear. They can check their reserve pin in the door if they have to. It would make more sense to me if the person waiting to check off jumpers in England watched them check their own gear, rather than did it for them. It tells you a lot about the jumper. Just turning your back towards whoever happens to be sat next to you in the plane while you make complicated handshakes with the assembled group seems bizarre to me. For freeflying it's not acceptable. Don't forget that your Cypres will fire at a different altitude dependant on your body position. Short closing loops are vital. Sounds so boring and obvious but most people could tune their rigs up a bit. We like people to do barrel rolls while they track away, without burning altitude, to help them check before they pull. If you want to learn to freefly, learn to read your altimeter from any body position. It will make you much stronger in the air, forcing a lack of symmetry.

What's your advice for new freeflyers?

Learn to skydive first. You should be able to pass your Cat 10, whether you have to or not. Learn to be capable on your belly. Skydive U will teach you a lot about how to learn. Get someone who is very good at CF to take you up, one to one, and teach you about canopies. Shorten your loop. Learn to lock the bridle when you pack your pilot chute. Learn to fly on your feet before trying on your head.

Do you find the UK different from the rest of the world?

I think the rest of the world perceive us differently too. Britain, land of the eccentric, is still often nervous of innovation and change. We can spend more time chasing rules than reason. Couldn't we concentrate on distributing information? Education is a better way to increase safety than regulation. Who knows, one day we might get even parts of England dragged into the 70's.

Sebastian XL, Spotty Bowles, *Playstation*, Darryl's *Another Planet*, they are all working so hard and achieving so much. I hope they get the support they deserve.

What was the Guinness show about?

It worked out well. A Guinness World Record for the furthest human flight. The record will read 'Adrian for Patrick DeGayardon' in the book. They have agreed to put in a tribute talking about his other records. I got one attempt, using a Garmin GPS to measure my track. Joe Jennings organised the filming, jumping with me to get the exit shot and using a helicopter to film the run. Katarina changed my wings in Hawaii. I got two minutes twenty for a freefall of twelve thousand feet, and covered eight kilometres. The show was a tribute to Patrick.

You've written a book about Patrick...

It's his life, in his words. We videotaped conversations while we travelled. He led the most extraordinary life. I learnt a lot writing the book. We finished checking the text the night before the accident in Hawaii. We hope that the Italian publishers can get it out this year.

Some people say he paid the price for pushing the limits too far, what would you say?

Patrick lived outside what other people thought was possible. His death in Hawaii was an accident, a tragic accident. He had imagination and the insatiable drive to discover what might be possible. He got things done. I think people around the world salute a pioneer, unique in the history of the sport. Patrick always did what anyone, who still has life left in them, must applaud. You have to admire a man who always reached for the stars.


On the Soapbox


CYPRES stands for <u>CY</u>bernetic Parachute Release System. Note: <u>Cy</u>bernetic not <u>Si</u>bernetic.



Dear Fee,

There are two possibilities:

1. You may be curving around your target, that means that you are going forward and, by keeping the visual on your target, you transfer this forward movement into a rotation. This would be because you are flying

arms too much and are not symmetrical. Flying with your arms needs a lot of strength and results into asymmetry and instability. You need to have the control with your legs. To prevent flying with your arms, do not attempt to grab the air with your hands. To correct asymmetry, pick a fixed object to reference off while in freefall, eg a mountain

Relaxing and deep breathing seem to be the key in obtaining a symmetrical body position. So don't forget to breathe deeply and take note of where your limbs are.

When you begin to fly in any vertical environment the airspeed and pressure are nearly doubled. At the higher freeflying airspeeds your limbs act as individual propellant pods.

Side-sliding is a very specific movement, one that takes some experienced freeflyers lots of time to master. Most people initially have problems with backsliding and driving forward. If side-sliding is your only problem, then you're doing pretty

Your primary way of staying centred is with the hip position. By moving them either forward or aft you generate anything

from a great deal of movement to absolute neutral. The limbs however, are a fine tuning utensil allowing you to side-slide among other various minor adjustments. So don't forget this skill and feeling, it will be useful as you progress.

Dive Dr Speed

Dear Dive Dr,

While I was doing AFF, I had to jump wearing weight. I am 50 kg. I don't like jumping with weight, but I was told I had to do it if I wanted to jump with other people. Is this true?

Dear Li

At under 8 stone you will probably have to wear weight to do formation skydiving (FS) in order to fall at a

similar speed to other people. It depends how supple you are as to how much you will need, if you can bend more you will need less. Weight on your belly will increase your fall rate. If you want to enter competitive FS you will definitely need weight to attain the best body position. Weight on the top of your body (shoulders) will even up your centre of gravity by pitching the top part of your body forward such that your arms will be more available for taking grips. All women and many lighter men will need shoulder weights for competitive FS. If you get into freeflying you will not need to wear lead. A big

bonus at your weight!

Dive Dr CC

Dear Dive Dr.

I have recently moved abroad and find that wind limits are nowhere near what they are in Britain.

Here in the US the drop zone seems happy for everyone to make their own decision as to whether they want to jump. It's often quite windy here, I want to jump but I don't want to hurt myself by over-reaching my limits. I land pretty good but not every time.

Can you help me decide when it is safe for me to jump?

Dear Gail

It is good that you are aware of your own limits or even that you

Understanding risk and taking responsibility for it is what being a grown-up skydiver is about. Appreciating that there is a decision to be made is the first part of making the correct decision.

If you stick to the BPA wind limit of 20 knots, you are most unlikely to have a problem. However these limits err on the side of caution and you may wish to jump in slightly higher winds. Watch out for gusty or turbulent winds. A fresh but steady breeze is more acceptable.

If it is a windy day, find out how windy and, if possible, sit and watch the anemometer for at least 10 minutes. That will show you if the wind is gusty or not. Watch other jumpers landing, looking out for their canopies twitching, folding in and out, suddenly dropping downwards or, in extreme cases, rolling under. Any of the above are signs of turbulence and you should probably avoid jumping. Try and put yourself in the shoes of the person under that twitchy canopy and think how happy or

situation. It is an old but true saying 'It is better to be down here wishing you were up there, than up there wishing you were down here!'

Another problem to be aware of in strong winds is that you may be more likely to land off the drop zone. Ask what the upper winds are doing, as a 'dog-leg', where the uppers are moving in a different direction to the ground wind, makes it harder to spot accurately. If your zone is surrounded by hazards then landing off presents a serious danger. If there are lots of safe alternative areas to land this is not so much of a concern. Watch the spotting for accuracy and consistency. (I am assuming you are jumping a square reserve.) Be aware of peer pressure, make your own decision and

If you do jump in strong winds, then be aware the flare is much later, shorter and quicker. Land in a sensible area well away from hangars, trees or structures which cause turbulence. This is good practice in normal winds



RIPPED TANDEM CANOPY

After canopy deployment the jumper checked the Tandem canopy and noticed some material missing on the top surface where it overhangs the nose, the jumper tried a couple of turns and a practice flare and all seemed to work okay. The jumpers elected to cutaway anyway and deploy the reserve parachute.

Conclusions: This decision turned out to be a good one as after inspecting the damaged main it turned out that the material missing at the nose overhang was a complete cell which had ripped off up to two thirds of the way towards the tail. After seeing the damage, no-one would have considered landing under this canopy

Recommendations: This is a decision that Tandem Instructors should consider for themselves. However my views are if a practice flare is required to determine if a Tandem canopy can land then it is obviously questionable and anything questionable on a Tandem Jump should not be accepted.

RSL's AND POP TOPS

During a kit check on a visiting jumper's rig the kit checker noticed that this rig had an RSL attached to a set of non-reinforced mini risers. This is against a BPA safety notice so the checker had the RSL disconnected. All seemed okay until the jumper visited another drop zone and that kit checker told him that the RSL should not have been removed without the reserve housing being sewn down on his Pop Top.

Conclusions: First of all a 'slap on the wrist' was given to the reserve packer who should have noticed this problem. Thanks to the BPA system the second person to check a rig before jumping is the drop zone kit checker who did a good job and stopped this jumper from using a

Tip of the month - Check your closing loop!

Although one of the smallest parts of your parachute assembly, the closing loop is a vital part of your rig. Replace it as soon as it shows signs of wear – do not wait for 'just one more jump'! Loops must not be too long, or too short, or too thick, or too stiff. Making one with the wrong material can stop your parachute from

deploying and result in a pilot chute in tow. This in turn can lead to two canopies deployed or, in the worse case, a main/reserve entanglement. A loop that lets the parachute deploy prematurely can kill you, your parachute or an aircraft. A high price to pay for a piece of string – but all these have happened.

rig that had a safety notice on it. The problem here however is that this kit checker did not realise that removing an RSL on a Pop Top can cause other complications.

Recommendations: When altering any system, even a simple task like disconnecting an RSL, give some thought to the possible consequences, ie, how the deployment and any drills could be affected. If someone was to pick a mushroom and eat it only to find out that it was a toadstool, they could be poisoned because what looks similar can have very different affects.

RISER INCORRECTLY ASSEMBLED

After a reserve inspection and repack a jumper did three jumps on her rig and after the third landing the riser disconnected from the container.

Conclusions: The riser had been assembled incorrectly, the small loop had not been passed through the grommet of the hard housing. This made it very easy to catch the housing and disconnect the riser. This rig had also been tagged ready for use by the drop zone checker after the reserve inspection and repack. I came across a similar incident like this when I noticed that the riser loop was not passed through the housing on another rig.

Recommendations: When inspecting equipment after any work has been done it is important to look at the detail not just the over-all appearance. A hands-on check by both the reserve packer and the kit checker would have prevented the problem. This incident could have been a lot worse so remember it is easy to become complacent.

RSL NOT RECONNECTED

An experienced jumper borrowed a student rig and decided to detach the RSL which was a rapid connector type. Students used the rig **four** times after this without the RSL being reconnected.

Conclusions: After checking the packing log it turns out that three instructors and one rigger instructor had done each flight line check, none of them noticed that the RSL had been removed. After talking with the instructors it was not obvious that the four jumpers were students because they were not part of a course but normal progression jumpers still on student status.

Recommendations: When doing a flight line check do not just look for the obvious problems but talk to those you are checking to see if any special requirement is required for each jumper's experience level.

TOTAL

After a successful freefall descent an AFF student pulled his ripcord and nothing happened. Reserve drills were correctly carried out and the student landed without any further problems.

Conclusions: The main pilot chute left after the reserve deployed. It is probable that the pilot chute was incorrectly packed with a centre flap caught between the spring. This could have prevented deployment of the main. After the reserve was deployed the pressure would be released so the main pilot chute was then able to deploy as normal.

Recommendations: With no other explanation this would have to be put down to a packing error. It may be that some rigs are more prone to bad packing than others are but each one would have to be evaluated on its merits.

LOOSE CHEST STRAP

A skydiver with 250+ jumps boarded the aircraft with his chest strap mis-routed. It came loose in freefall.



Conclusions and Recommendations: The reason we have a flight line checking system is to prevent this type of incident. Please use the flight line check to assist your fellow skydivers in having a safe skydive.

UNWANTED VELCRO

During a reserve inspection and repack the reserve packer noticed that a strip of Velcro used during packing had not been removed from the previous pack job, which could have hindered deployment.

Conclusions: After contacting the previous reserve packer it turned out that the strip of Velcro could have been left on the free bag by either the last packer or the one previous as the last person to pack the reserve said he did not do a complete inspection and repack. Whoever left the Velcro strip on the free bag had obviously lost tool control during the reserve repack. What is also very worrying is that a reserve packer decided to trust the previous reserve packer and sign the inspection report form stating that he had done a full inspection and repack. This was not a true statement as he only added a Cypres after a service, which was mid-way through some one else's reserve repack cycle.

Recommendations: First of all tool control is a vital part of a reserve inspection and repack. It is the responsibility of every reserve packer to demonstrate how they control their tools to prevent this type of incident. Either use a shadow board, or count all tools before a repack and check all tools are present after completing the job, or use any other method that works. Finally a reserve packer should never complete a record of inspection form without doing a complete inspection; read the form and look at what is being signed for.

BRAKE FIRES

I am still receiving reports of brake toggles releasing prematurely causing reserve rides. Remember that any toggle that is held on by elastic will be vulnerable to premature release as the elastics wear very quickly. Because I have discussed this many times please read previous reports for more detailed information and preventative tips.

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
