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## Guidelines for Supervising Riggers

Basic Riggers must work under the supervision of at least a PR of two years' experience, who is responsible for all work carried out by the BR.

The BR must keep a log of all work carried out, and each item should be inspected, and signed for, by the supervising rigger.

All items manufactured must be labelled.

Method 1 BRs will have completed a 5 day course, where Rigger Examiners will have given the lessons detailed in the syllabus and introduced the BR to several manufacturing projects. The role of the supervising rigger is to expand the candidates learning, and to ensure they are exposed to a variety of supervised work; canopy repairs, line replacements (brake line, single line, line sets) etc.

Method 2 BRs will require the supervising rigger to cover the training syllabus, and this is to be recorded on the candidates Proficiency Card (form 364). Some of these will be graduated learning (i.e. sewing machine usage and maintenance or the use of handtools) and others will require a more formal lesson (Canopy design and construction).

The candidate must be exposed to a variety of supervised work; canopy repairs, line replacements (brake line, single line, line sets) etc.

### **Records**

In addition to Form 364 (PR proficiency card) the candidate must keep a log of all rigging work carried out and detail what design was used, or what it was a copy of. All items must be signed for by the supervising rigger, noting the time taken and any learning points or comments.

### **Submissions**

The candidate must manufacture labelled examples of each item on the syllabus, the label should reference the entry in their log of work.

### **PR Course**

Prior to the candidate attending the PR course the supervising rigger should check that the PR Proficiency Card (Form 364) has been completed and then complete the recommendation on the course application (Form 316).
